Our trail west next month begins at Stillwater, Oklahoma. Here we witness Sheriff Bill Fox's excellent detective work in tracking a cruel murderer and bringing him to justice. From Stillwater the trail leads southwest to Texas where we reconstruct the way of life of the inhabitants of 10,000 years ago. Then, we continue west and on into the Sacramento Mountains of New Mexico where we meet Billy the Kid as he runs from the law which gives us a new view of the infamous gunfighter. As we journey westward we are in time to see the robbery of the Southern Pacific Express near Wilcox, Arizona.

The next stop in the far north country of the Yukon forces us to leave the trail and take to the air. After a fast flight we find ourselves in Dawson City during the Klondike gold rush of '98. Our visit includes numerous dance halls where we meet Klondike Kate and other notorious damsels of the era. Our plane is waiting and in a short space of time we are at the Little Big Horn in 1876, witnessing the Custer massacre through the eyes of one of the Indian participants.

Once again we take to the trail and find ourselves in Montana. First is the episode of Hugh Glass, famous frontiersman, and his fight for life against a wild grizzly and the mountain winter. (We had planned to have this adventure in this issue but we lost our fight against the deadline). Second, at Fort Missoula we are just in time to accompany a troop of cavalry mounted on bicycles all the way from Montana to St. Louis, Missouri. On the Nebraska plains we watch a battle between the Pawnee and the Sioux. It is a bloody affair and we are glad to hit the trail again. Our last stop is in Colorado where we follow the misfortunes of Joe Slade, notorious highwayman on the Overland Trail. Don't miss this journey into the past.
