THE COVER

Gen. Douglas MacArthur kept one handy "but not on me" during World War II and Korea. More than 150,000 found favor with those wanting hideaway protection guns. The Remington "double derringer," just under 5" long and weighing 11 oz., was made from 1866 to 1935. It came in only one caliber, a stubby .41 rimfire, and originally sold for \$8 (plain, blued) to \$17.50 (engraved, gilt, pearl grips). Now it is a valued collector item. Little or no fresh ammunjtion is available. But numerous recent imjtations in everything from .22 short to .357 and .45 Colt attest to its persistent popularity.
