Squirrels, rabbits, chucks and other varmints are great for "tuning up" for bigger game. How can binoculars help? Two very important ways.

First, anticipate your elusive quarry. Select a vantage point and study the entire area spot the escape routes, the watering areas, the several places game will move toward, if startled.

Secondly, pinpoint the game before it sees you. These animals have extra keen vision. Add to this their natural camouflage, and they've got a head start for cover and safety.
