These 16 men covered the short, bloody war in the Middle East for us. Because of the ominous build-up, nine of them were already on the many fronts when the fighting broke out—five with the Israelis, who were attacking in four different directions, two in Cairo, one in Jordan, one with the Sixth Fleet. The others moved in as soon as airfields reopened. These men faced artillery shellings, machine-gun fire, bombings, sniper bullets. For a while, they all faced the agonizing frustration of not being able to get their pictures and their firsthand reports back to us. On the Arab side they also faced harassment by hysterical mobs, arrest and confinement, confiscation of film. What they have done is their best tribute to the spirit of Paul Schutzer, who gave his life for the coverage of this war.
