The hardware is engraved and has a gold-washed background. The lock is marked "in Reichenberg" and the barrel "B. U. Jirku Junior" on the top flat and "Guss Stahl" at right angle to the bore. Tang is marked "G. S." The cal. .45 barrel is 30" long, and over-all length of the gun is 45". Transparency was made by Harry C. Knode of Dallas.
