HINTS ON HUNTING DEER IN HEAVY BRUSH

Soon, many of you will greet that first frosty morn . . . rifle ready, on the alert for the flashing flag or brushstin' break of a startled buck!

With the hope you'll produce that venison the little woman is anxiously (if skeptically) awaiting, here are more tips on how binoculars can help you bag your buck! Last month we talked about Western hunting. Now, let's share some ideas from Midwestern and



VISION VS. VENISON-"... Before using binocu-lars, I seldom saw a deer until too late. Now, my method is to walk quietly, five steps at a time, stop-ping to crouch and look under the branches. Those brilliant binoculars literal-"tunnel thru" timber The stereoscopic effect of my Bushnell's reveals brightly-lit pockets be-tween the masses of foliage. Often, a half-hidden

leg; a piece of "off"-color, a patch of fur. I listen, too, for distant shots, auto horns, slamming of car doors. Noises are cues to watch for movements of nervous game."

FINDING HIDDEN & BEDDED GAME-"... Since getting your 7 x 35 binoculars, I've worked out a good way to find deer in brush-covered hills. I approach every ridge or hilltop with caution. If game is not in clear sight, I quickly sweep the area with my binoculars. If nothing shows up, I start from a point within 100 yards, examining everything in one field of view before moving binoculars. By systematically overlapping fields, I inspect everything between me and the next hill. If I still don't hit the jackpot, I move 100 yards to one side. This second position often uncovers game hidden by shadows, brush, or land irregularities."

POINTS... OR PENALTY? —"... In Northern Minnesota, deer hide in the Tamarac swamps after the first day's hunt. It's dark in there, even at high noon. Once, poor light almost caused me to kill a doe. Thought I saw antlers. I missed, but that showed me I'd better stop guessing. First, I tried a pair of 7 x 35's. They helped, but didn't have enough illumination, especially in late evening. Your magnesium 7 x 50 "night glasses" were really the ticket! In the gloomiest cover, those light-gatherers spotlight a deer's sex and size instantly!
