items. About a week before the vacation she would buy these products as most were not perishable. She also pointed out that some travel guides such as one put out by Mobil contains discount coupons. Some camping guides also have these discount coupons.

This same woman said she looks for discount coupons in newspapers as they travel and often she finds refund forms she has never seen before. She also said that when they stayed with friends they would help the hostess by shopping for them, using money-saving coupons.

"When we eat out as we travel," she added, "we often have our big meal at noon. You can get almost the same thing at noon than at dinner in the evening, and it will cost you less. Usually, the only thing added in the evening is desert or coffee. When we have our big meal at noon, we then settle for a sandwich of cold cuts in our motel room. We also carry a coffee pot and a toaster as we travel. That can provide toasted sandwiches or toast for breakfast.
