J. R. Eyerman, who took the picture essay on Guam (see pp. 63-75), has worked more steadily with the Pacific Fleet than any other civilian war photographer. He first joined a U.S. task force in March 1944 joined a U.S. task force in March 1944 when he boarded the carrier Lexington. Except for a few quick trips home he has remained in combat ever since. Carrier war is his particular specialty, but when he went to Guam recently he was no stranger there, having photographed U.S. marines and soldiers reconquering the island from the Japanese just ten months earlier.


