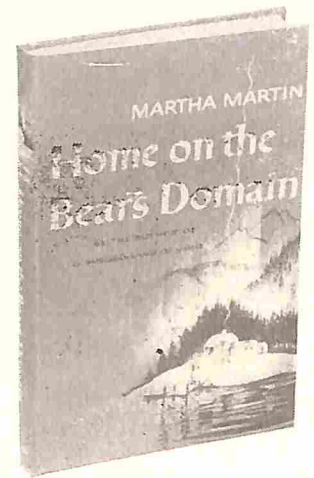

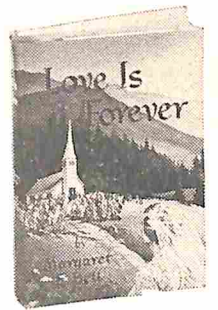

NEWLY RELEASED ALASKA BOOKS



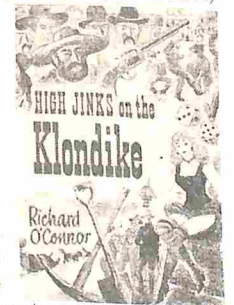
