One of them features Roland Martin, who probably is one of the top three bass fishermen in the U.S.

Actually, most tackle firms have a movie library and you can obtain films free of charge from most of them.

You also should write the American Fishing Tackle Manufacturers Assn. at 2626 Clearbrook Drive, Arlington Heights, Illinois 60005. That organization will give you various leads on obtaining movies for your club.

Q.: Why don't other states do like Wisconsin does by printing hunting regulations pamphlet that cover two years?

A.: I think it is a good idea and I am told that the two-year concept saves \$25,000 in printing costs and also enables hunters to plan vacations and hunting times well in advance. Wisconsin urges hunters to keep their regulations through 1982 and any new rules in 1982 will be published in a separate

Q.: I want to release most of the fish I catch and I don't want to harm the fish. What are your suggestions on this?

A.: First, land the fish as quickly as possible to minimize exhaustion. Handle the fish as little as possible with wet hands. Do not squeeze the fish. Keep any fish which is bleeding from the gills or throat or which shows air bladder damage. Release fish gently and do not throw them into the water as you see many fishermen do. Do not release fish which have been held in a cooler or in the bottom of the boat.

Some fishermen will exchange a smaller fish for a bigger one that is just caught. When you do that, you doom the smaller fish for it likely will die when put back in the water.

Q.: Is there any type of printed information available on Ohio parks?

A.: You're in luck. Ohio has just published a full-sized 16-page newspaper that is chock full of information on the state's 71 parks.

This newspaper features detailed articles on each park with information on overnight accommodations, recreational facilities, backpacking trails, horse trails, special events and more.

In addition there is a listing of phone numbers, and winter sports are fea-
