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'Nobody we met seemed to care'

Five years ago, in the days of Lady Bird, the cause of highway beautification suddenly became popular with conservationists and political leaders across the U.S. Recently Correspondent Richard Woodbury and Photographer Michael Rougier traveled the highways of the nation to see what, if anything, had been achieved in those last five years. The result of their trip appears on pages 26-34.

"From one end of the country to the other," says Rougier, "the highways are a mass of billboards, junk heaps and neon lights. Most of the billboards are in bad taste, many are in dire need of repair, and for some perverse reason they seem to be concentrated in areas of natural beauty. Even when you drive along a country road it's sometimes difficult to see the trees. With the exception of landscape architects, nobody we met seemed to care much about the problem. They didn't even seem to notice it. Once, when we were shooting Tucson's speedway, a patrolman in a cruiser stopped by and took a look through my 1,000-mm lens. 'My God,' he said, 'is that what this street looks like?' "

Rougier did much of his shooting right from the highway. But he ran into trouble when he tried to get into junkyards and garbage dumps. "Obviously we couldn't count on junkyard owners to cooperate," says Woodbury. "To get into one huge private dump just north of San Francisco, we filled our station wagon with all the trash we could find and went in as paying customers. While I slowly unloaded our garbage, Mike slipped off up a hill to shoot."

Rougier and Woodbury covered 12,000 miles, traveling from the Northwest down through the Rocky Mountains to the Arizona desert, and on to the Midwest, the Smoky Mountains, Florida and New York's Hudson Valley. "In the East," says Woodbury, "we found the problem serious but oddly less acute than we had expected, probably because there is not much scenery left to spoil. But Florida was a different matter. Mike had lived there until three years ago, and as we headed south, he said, 'Now you'll see some beautiful beaches.' But we didn't see anything of the sort. All the views from the coast road which Mike remembered from three years earlier had been blocked by new billboards."
