


## THE PAST REDISCOVERED IS RELEVANT TODAY



Our forebears were depicted (left) in a drawing based on experiences described by Amerigo Vespucci. Now the unfairly maligned explorer has been rediscovered on his 500th birthday (pp. 101-114) by scholarly Colombian.



The Jesuits have been a part of the American scene ever since 1566. The present-day counterparts of Father Marquette, shown on the Mississippi in 1673 (right), are described in the photographic essay on pages 134-148.
