

# MAKING THE NEWS, ASSIST FROM THE SUN

To get news, most of the time, we have to chase after it. But not always. In this issue, we make news with our exclusive lead story—the confession of Adolf Eichmann (p. 19), who helped plan and carry out Hitler's monstrous extermination of Europe's Jews. Much has been written about Eichmann since he was taken from Argentina by Israeli agents. Now here is the man, telling his story.

How he came to tell it is itself a tale. At a bar in Buenos Aires, where he was living under an assumed name, Eichmann struck up a friendship with a German journalist named Wilhelm Sassen and offered to give him a "hot story"





about the Hitler regime. Sassen began a series of interviews. "I hadn't the slightest idea he was Eichmann," says Sassen. Then one evening the Nazi slipped. "How could I, Eichmann . . ." he said. And Sassen knew.

The tape-recorded interviews continued. To the transcription Eichmann added footnotes and emendations. But he told Sassen, "You will get this only if I am dead or a prisoner." Soon after he became a prisoner, LIFE obtained his manuscript.

Our other item of special news is the result of a perfect piece of timing—by the sun. That hot body is the subject of the last in our IGY series, New Portrait of Our Planet (pp. 64-78), which we started planning more than a year ago. The color pages in this instalment were already running on the presses when, last week, the sun acted up as it is shown in the stunning painting on pages 64, 65. A violent sun storm caused some of the greatest solar flares in history. These played havoc with radio communications on earth, blazed the skies with lovely auroras—and made the front pages. (You can see the counterpart of the rare red aurora on page 75.)

We hope we deserve credit along with the sun. We did the series because we consider IGY's findings news in the broadest sense discoveries that add to the knowledge of the world we live in. And just as the atomic age made concepts and words like neutron and fission familiar to everybody, so IGY will add ionized particles, fission raminal to particles, electrojets and Van Allen belts to our knowledge and vocabulary.
