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The citizens of East Germany—these workers in Leipzig among them—have been strangers to us. Their country, the German Democratic Republic, is right in the middle of Europe, but it has been largely cut off from West Germany and from us. On its twentieth anniversary, it's time to take a look. East Germany has become an industrial power in the world, the economic keystone of Eastern Europe. Socialism there even has a dash of capitalism in it. Communist? Yes, but certainly German first.
