Punkin Balls Shoot Pressure Up

Dear Ed-I note in a recent issue of M-B an article about punkin balls in a shotgun, and whether they run the pressures up. I can say, most emphatically, they do. I am convinced that round balls run the pressure up 25% in a m-l gun and 50% if smokeless is used. I recall one instance in which I dropped a 12 gauge round ball in a cylinder bored 12 gauge in place of a heavy load of shot, and it set me back on my heels, and the printing on the head of the shell was flattened. It was a '97 Winny, though, so it took it.

I have seen m-l guns loosen up the rib if used with many solid balls and full loads of powder, when they would go along for years with the same load of powder and a weight of shot equaling the round ball. Why this should be so I do not know. It is likely due to the fact that a load of shot has more give to it and yields to the powder gas more slowly and keeps the pressure down. But I can affirm that punkin balls do certainly run up pressures, and all users of shotguns would do well to heed this fact. If you want to use round balls, use a much undersized one and a heavy patch, even of leather, or equally thick stock. Taken all in all it's best to stick to buckshot. You can pile them in a small circle up to 100 yards by using the old trick of stringing them together.


