
In the fall of this year, you will see a complete test report, including the results of an Alaska hunt, about a rifle produced by a brand new company. Ramrodded by Marty Fiorillo, the Frontier Arms Company, Inc., of 420 East Riding Club Road, Cheyenne, Wyo. 82001, will be offering three different kinds of rifles this year.

The standard grade, destined to retail around \$169, features Centurion actions, Star barrels and walnut stocks. The stock lines will be the classic ones, and the guns will be chambered for all of the popular big game factory cartridges. The Deluxe model will feature Douglas Premium barrels, FN 400 actions and stocks commonly referred to as the California style. Again all factory calibers will be offered, and there is a strong possibility that wildcat calibers will also be available. The third model will be the Custom gun, with engraving and special stock work. Here, the customer can decide on his own engraving, including gold inlays, stocks

with secondary and tertiary woods, and prices will depend entirely on the gun and the amount of work that goes into producing the rifle.

Marty Fiorillo is a long-time gunsmith who knows his business. Some years ago I had the pleasure of shooting one of his rifles. The rifle I had for testing at that time was built along the classic lines, and if memory serves me, was chambered for 7mm Remington Magnum cartridge. The guns are essentially hunting guns, and the major emphasis is on big game hunting rifles. The company will also manufacture, if requested and on special order, some target rifles as well as some heavy varmint rifles, but as of this moment no details about those guns are available.
