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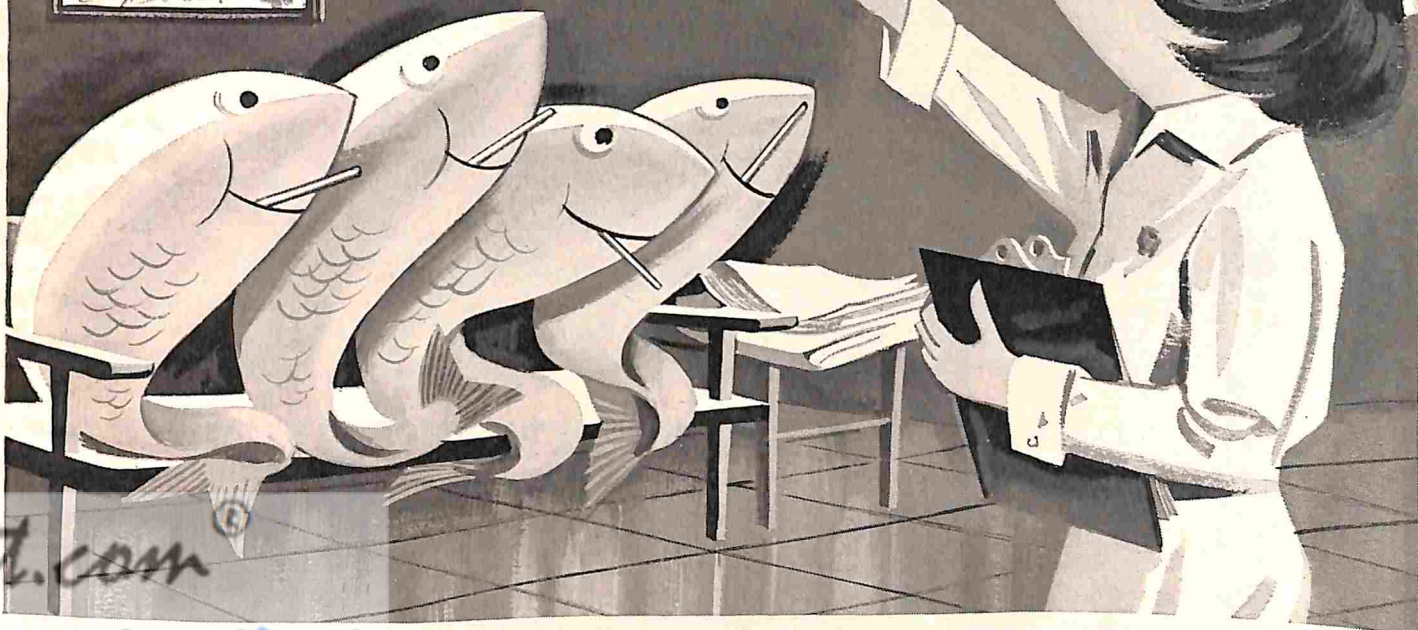

## How to use a thermometer for a healthy catch!

H. QUEST, JR., UPTON, WYO.: A thermometer fastened to your wading staff is an excellent indicator for deciding, at a glance, whether to use wet or dry flies.

P. SPEDINGER, KENMORE, N. Y.: To find an oil leak in your outboard motor, dust motor with talcum powder. Leak will show up on the white powder.

H. ALLARD, NEW YORK, N. Y.: Dip your bucktail lure in excess Sardine or Anchovy oil, for an excellent chumming effect. You'll find that fish find this irresistible.

W. BOYD, MIAMI, FLA.: To keep your eye-glasses from falling overboard, thread 8 lb. test Monofilament through holes drilled into the tip of each eye-glass temple. Knot the ends and wear around neck.

W. REED, MORGANVILLE, KAN.: To make an improvised ramrod, cut a 1/4" diameter sapling to a foot longer than your rifle barrel. Split the larger end; insert piece of handkerchief or other cloth to serve as a patch.

F. BEARD, SARASOTA, FLA.: To keep arrows from falling out of a quiver, fit a 2" thick piece of styrofoam into the bottom of the quiver and stick the arrows into the styrofoam.

N. EASON, CHICAGO, ILL.: To tie down the corner of a tarp lacking grommet holes, wrap each corner three times around a small twig. Tie loop around knob made by the twig.

R. ROY, BURLINGTON, VT.: A spill-proof method for loading air rifles: Pour BBs into an empty oil can. Load by inserting nozzle of oil can into load opening.

C. BOSEWORTH, NEW ORLEANS, LA.: An excellent toaster can be made by placing a piece of metal plastering lath atop a camp stove or in the bottom of a frying pan.

H. McLELLAN, ROSWELL, N. M.: An old hubcap placed under the center pole of your umbrella tent, prevents skidding, floor damage, and also makes an excellent ash tray.
