



QUESTION: IS IT TOO EARLY TO BE THINKING ABOUT THE 1980 OLYMPIC GAMES?

ANSWER: **NYET!**

These Games will be different from any previous Olympics. For the first time they will be held in a country and a city which strictly control access and movement. For the first time there will be no alternative source of arrangements. All arrangements—train, plane, hotels, sightseeing, guides, everything—are made only through Intourist, the government-operated travel bureau. If you can't make it through Intourist, you can't make it, period.

At this point in time, we can't be confident of being able to accommodate all who will want to come with us to Moscow. It's a different game and we can't be sure of the rules. We have 164 persons signed now, and *it will be first come, first served*. We have begun to make our arrangements, and we strongly urge you to do the same. Join us now and be assured of a high priority.

Tour will include round-trip air, tickets to all track finals, opportunity to buy tickets to other sports, lodging in Moscow, wind-up celebrity party, etc. Tentatively, we are including meals in the package, as well, since restaurant hunting in Moscow can be troublesome and very time-consuming.

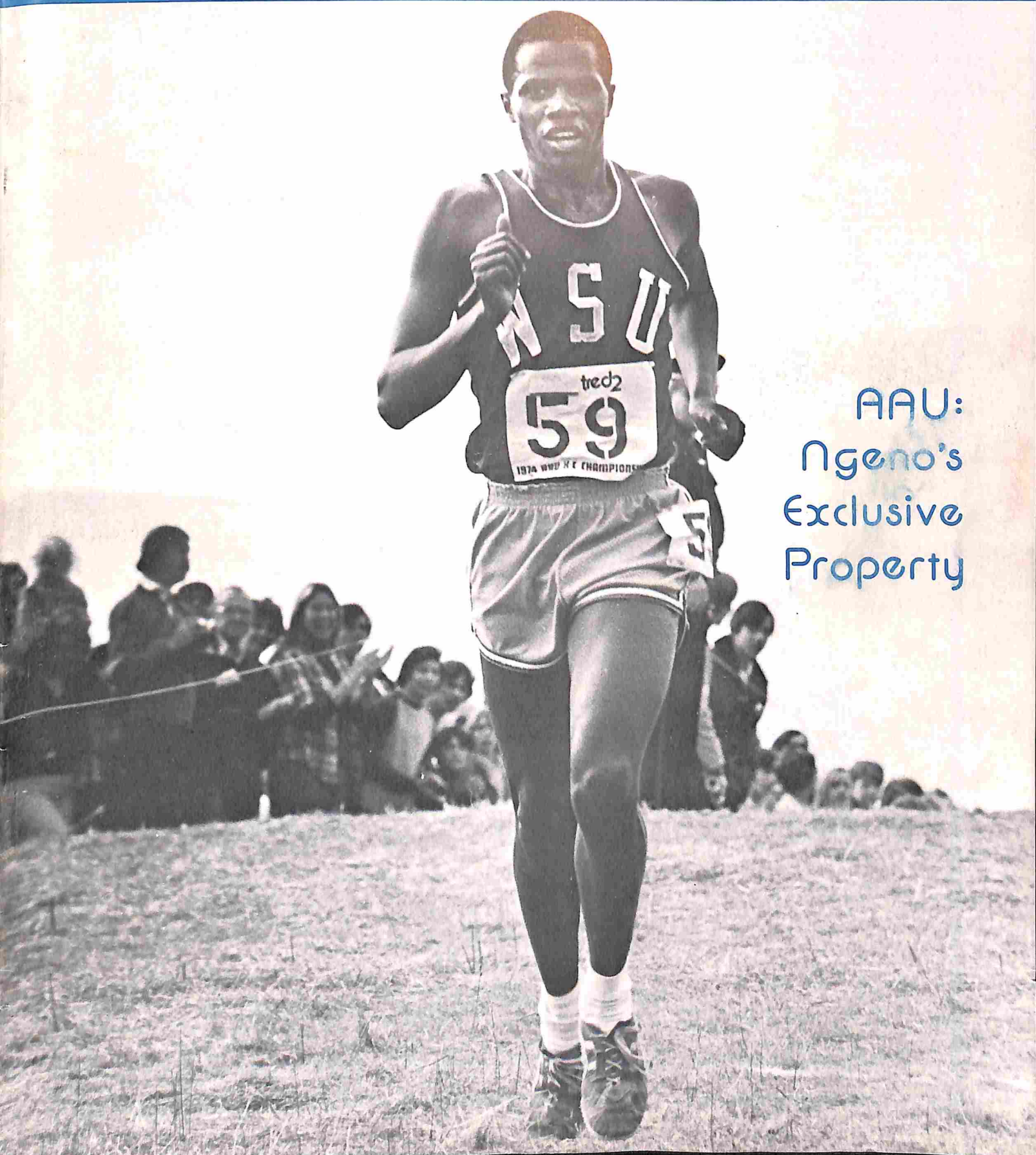
ON THE COVER
